E-mail Users

There now are 375 Senior Men's Club users of e-mail. SMC e-mail includes *The Reminder*, an occasional meeting notice, and member death notices. With each of these e-mailings, there are some messages that are returned by the Internet Service Provider marked "User unknown," or "Mail quota exceeded."



The "User unknown" undeliverables generally result from the member changing his email address and forgetting to tell the Senior Men's Club. (Sometimes they result from a member discontinuing e-mail service and forgetting to tell the Club). The "Mail quota exceeded" undeliverables generally result from the member not opening his e-mail often enough and his mailbox fills up. (This happens commonly with no-charge Internet Service Providers that give the user only a small amount of online storage).

It requires a substantial amount of time to follow up on these undeliverables, and this has become burdensome. Accordingly, we plan to begin discontinuing SMC e-mail service to those whose e-mail is not deliverable.

Our first stop is the General Motors Heritage Center in Sterling Heights. The center has 81,000 square feet of space, housing more than 180 vehicles spanning 10 decades. The vehicle collection showcases a wide range of GM design, technology and innovation from antique to concept vehicles. This facility is less than a year old and will commemorate GM's 100th anniversary in 2008. We are fortunate to have this opportunity, as this center is not open to the public.

At the completion of our visit, we go to Lake Shore Drive, the site of the Edsel and Eleanor Ford House. This magnificent house situated on 78 acres along Lake St. Clair, was designed by Albert Kahn and landscaped by Jens Jensen. It was completed in 1927, and thanks to Mrs. Ford it has been preserved. We will have a full lunch followed by a tour of the great house and grounds. The house has been kept in an "as lived in" state. We



will hear family stories and traditions on our guided tour through 20 rooms filled with original furnishings. The grounds are a master gardener's dream come true and include among other things, the play house, pool house and South Cottage exhibit.

This is a great "two for one" outing. Tickets go on sale Friday, May 13. The bus will leave the Presbyterian Church of Birmingham at 9:00 a.m. June 15, 2005.

Tickets are priced at \$40.00, including transportation.

SMILE, RAISE BOTH ARMS,SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE. If the affected person has trouble with any of these tasks, call 9-1-1 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

We will revisit the fully restored steam locomotive No. 1225 which is now

This 2-8-4 Berkshire locomotive is one of 39 of the largest engines ever bought by the Pere Marquette Railroad back in 1941. - The Institute has recently completed a fully operating turn-table over 100 feet long that can accomodate old No. 1225.
- They have built a new two-track engine house to make it an all weather visit.
- The Institute now owns enough track to give us a shuttle ride using a fired up little switcher steam engine with trailing cabooses.

The second meeting of the Senior Men's Club reading pilot group took place April 6 in The Community House "Library Room." Led by member Bob Kirsammer the 13 attendees discussed <u>The Devil in the White City</u> by Erik Larson. It is the story of Chicago in the 1890's and of two men, architect Daniel Hudson Burnham, the 1893 Chicago World's Fair's brilliant director of works, and Hanry H. Holmes, a serial murderer and young doctor who in a melian

brilliant director of works, and Henry H. Holmes, a serial murderer and young doctor who, in a malign parody of the White City, built his "World's Fair Hotel" just west of the fairgrounds. Our readers found the alternating chapters maintained pace and attention. "An interesting book with the discussion increasing the value gained from the reading," was the consensus.

Participants selected Virginia Woolf's most popular novel, <u>To The Lighthouse</u> as the reading for the meeting on May 4. Suggestions for additional readings in the following months were discussed in categories ranging from history to humor, and classics to current affairs. As a pilot group we recognized that some of our process and approach may need to be altered with experience in order to meet our expectations. A group size of about 20 to 22 will result in about 15 (the optimum for a lively discussion) at each meeting. The SMC is prepared to support a second group when enough members are interested.
