



Senior Health Matters— **Age Related Macular Degeneration**



Age related macular degeneration (ARMD) is a common cause of loss of central vision required for reading, watching television, recognizing faces and

the performance of other activities of daily living such as driving. It afflicts 10% of the elderly between 65 and 74 and 30% of those over 75.

There are two types of ARMD. Nearly 90% is of the "dry" variety which is characterized by deposits of vellow material called "drusen" that are concentrated in the center of vision of the retina (the back of the eye where light focuses). In this type, vision loss is gradual in one or both eyes. It may progress as distortion of straight lines and reliance on brighter lights or a magnifying glass for tasks that require fine visual acuity.

The "wet" variety is marked by the growth of abnormal blood vessels, which leak fluid and/or blood in and behind the retina. It is characterized by rapid distortion and loss of central vision over a period of weeks to months. Although the wet type is found in only 10% of those with ARMD, it accounts for more than 80% of severe visual loss or legal blindness.

ARMD is twice as common in smokers and is associated with abnormal fat metabolism, history of coronary heart disease or stroke and heavy alcohol intake of over 3 drinks a day. Age, family history and inheritance of specific genes are nonmodifiable risk factors as well. It is more common in women than in men.

Treatment began over 40 years ago with the use of thermal lasers to seal off leaking blood vessels followed by photodynamic therapy in combination with a photosensitizing dye. Currently, vascular endothelial growth factor (VEGF) inhibitor is injected into the eye by a retina specialist to reduce abnormal new blood vessel formation. Prevention or slowing the progression of ARMD consists of a diet rich in carotenoids (particularly green leafy vegetables), lutein, zeaxanthin, omega-3 fatty acids (fish), zinc and the antioxidant vitamins C, E and beta-carotene.
