POSH GULATI—AN EXEMPLARY SMCB MEMBER



Our esteemed friend, colleague, and dedicated chairman of the Visitation and Health Committee, Dr. Subhash "Posh" Gulati, is not just another jovial and compassionate character at our Friday meetings. No sir. All of you who play Friday afternoon Bridge know him as a serious student of the game and a worthy opponent. But did

you know he has earned the elite status of Émerald Life Master, the ranking bestowed by the American Contract Bridge League several years ago?

"Posh" has amassed 10,060.27 ACBL Masterpoints (MPs), a milestone which ranks him 937th out of 127,362 players! He ranks 24th among 6,500+ District 12 players in Michigan, northern Ohio and Indiana, and a solid 4th among the 875 members of a more local Unit 203. Outstanding, you'll agree.

He needs a National Victory of a minimum 2-3 day event at NABC level to become a Grand Life Master, joining the other 900 in the country. Our town's biggest MPs holder, Bert Newman, Posh's bridge mentor, has more than 25,000 MPs, but lacks the National Victory needed to be a Grand Life Master.

Following a life altering back injury and inspired by his father, his tennis partner and physician colleague, Posh took up bridge at the tender age of 48! The fact that wife, Kiran, declared she'd had enough of being a tennis widow over the prior fifteen years helped Posh make the right decision.

Posh has served six years as District 12 president, nine years on the national Board of Governors, a Unit member for more than 20 years and Unit president for more than 10 years. He is a qualified teacher, director, club owner and winner of many events and trophies. But that national victory needed to become a Grand Life Master still eludes him.

Our friend estimates he has spent over six figures in pursuit of the pinnacle of the game he loves. When he is not playing bridge, he is thinking about playing bridge and solving bridge riddles in his sleep.

Hearty SMCB congratulations to Posh on this remarkable milestone and well-earned achievement!

The two books scheduled for discussion in July will stimulate further discussion about World War II and modern China. Buzz Bissinger's The Mosquito Bowl helps us better appreciate how individual lives were impacted by the wartime decisions made by leaders of the government and the military. Michael Buckley provides an in-depth look at China's impact on Tibet.

While we traditionally conduct our discussion via Zoom, the Monday group decided to move the July 17 session to the Baldwin Library with a Zoom option. Swarn Rajpal, who will lead that session on Meltdown in Tibet, has arranged for Martin Rowell to join us to share his experiences in Tibet.

Wednesday, July 5, 10:30 AM: The Mosquito Bowl: A Game of Life and Death in World War II by Buzz Bissinger. New York: Harper-Collins, 2022.

While the actual game played on Christmas Eve 1944, Is only a small part of this book, Bissinger does a wonderful job of introducing us to a group of young marines who were truly part of "the greatest generation". Many of these men were talented college and, in a few cases, NFL football players whose athletic and professional careers were put on hold during their service in the Pacific leading up to the invasion of Okinawa.

From the NY Journal of Books: "The Mosquito Bowl will make you laugh, will make you cheer, and will make you cry. It makes you wonder at the valor and honor of men willing to sacrifice themselves for others. Men who, for one afternoon on a Godforsaken island in the South Pacific in the midst of a war, could put their fears and trepidations aside for a few hours and do that which they loved doing the most: play football."

Bob Maxfield will lead his discussion.

Monday, July 17, 3 PM: Meltdown in Tibet: China's Reckless Destruction of Ecosystems from the Highlands of Tibet to Deltas of Asia by Michael Buckley. New York: St. Martin's Press, 2014.

From the publisher: "Tibetans have experienced waves of genocide since the 1950s. Now they are facing ecocide. The Himalayan snowcaps are in meltdown mode, due to climate change—accelerated by a rain of black soot from massive burning of coal and other fuels in both China and India. The mighty rivers of Tibet are being dammed by Chinese

engineering consortiums to feed the mainland's thirst for power, and the land is being relentlessly mined in search of minerals to feed China's industrial complex. On the drawing board are plans for a massive engineering project to divert water from Eastern Tibet to water-starved Northern China."

From Forbes.com: "Meltdown in Tibet is an instructive book on the roof of the world. Its documentation is impeccable, and it deals with Tibet seen from a rarely tackled angle: its role in world climate."

This book was nominated by George Stern and the discussion will be led by Swarn Rajpal.

On Monday, July 10th at 1:00 PM, via Zoom, Jon Haber will present the 1961 neo-western drama "The Misfits" (2 hours / 5 minutes) directed by John Huston, written by Arthur Miller, and starring Clark Gable, Marilyn Monroe, Montgomery Clift, Thelma Ritter, and Eli Wallach. The story centers upon Monroe, a newly divorced woman who arrives in Reno, and her relationships with her landlady (Ritter), an old-school cowboy (Gable), his best friend (Wallach), and their rodeoriding buddy (Clift). Each of the men become immediately infatuated with Marilyn upon meeting her and this, in turn, sets up some intense rivalry between them.

"The Misfits" did not do well at the box office at the time of its initial release but received critical acclaim for its script and the actors' outstanding performances. Its reputation has shifted over the years, and many critics and movie buffs now consider the film to be a masterpiece and one of the best films of the 1960's. The movie holds a 7.2/10-star rating with the IMDb and a Rotten Tomatoes score of 97%

This film also captures the last performances of both Clark Gable and Marilyn Monroe. Gable passed away twelve days after the filming ended, while Monroe died about a year and a half after the film's release.
