

He graduated from Wayne State University in 1964 earning his Doctor of Medicine (MD) degree. Jerry did his internship at Detroit Receiving Hospital and his residency in Neurological Surgery at Wayne State University Detroit Medical Center.

He received a fellowship in Pediatric Neurosurgery at Boston Children's Hospital.

Jerry was a Captain in the US Air Force Reserve at Selfridge Air Force Base from 1965–1971 where he served as Commander of a MASH (Mobile Army Surgical Hospital) unit.

Jerry was on the faculty of the Wayne State College of Medicine. He was an instructor in Anatomy and Neuro Anatomy, Assistant Professor of Neurological Surgery and taught Harper and Children's Hospitals Neurosurgery residents how to operate while a staff neurosurgeon. He was also the Chief of Neurosurgery at Providence Hospital later in his career.

Jerry and his wife Carol were married in 1967, reside in Bloomfield Hills and attend The First Presbyterian



Church of Birmingham. They have 4 children and 6 grandchildren.

Please welcome our newest Life Member – Jerry Moore.



## **SMCB Volunteer Opportunities:**

Inspired by Pastor Jones' presentation earlier this year to SMCB, Bob Maxfield and Paul Lieberman have been working on putting together a volunteer tutoring program with the Senior Men's Club in mind. Some of the features of the program are:

The purpose of Volunteer Tutor.org is to facilitate the matching of students whose performance level (not grade level) is K-8 who want to be tutored for free with volunteer tutors in the relatively safe environment of zoom or other internet platform.

<u>Convenient:</u> no tutor "training" classes, no finger print or TB testing, no traveling; the Tutor and Students agree to the meeting time and the methodology. (Note: In order to work with Pastor Jones' contacts or Pontiac Schools directly, it may be necessary to go through an additional screening process).

<u>Safe:</u> no in-person contacts; potential tutors will be screened on the "National Sex Offender Public Website". Parents or guardians will sign waivers designed to protect tutors from liability except criminal behavior. Many programs do not have these protections.

<u>Free:</u> many so called free programs are really traps to sell tutors or students their tutoring experience; neither Tutors nor Students will pay to be part of the volunteertutor.org tutoring program.

Complementary: Volunteertutor.org believes that there are significant gaps (due to safety concerns, availability and mobility issues, etc) in what is now available to volunteer tutors and students and it is hoping to fill many of those gaps. It is a complementary program; it does not want to compete with the many good free programs which already meet the needs of their tutors or students. When a program cannot meet the needs of their tutors or students, volunteertutor.org may be a good alternative.

We are now looking for those who are interested in more information as the program with Reverend Jones unfolds. In the meantime, you can visit the website at www.volunteertutor.org.

#### What Does It Take To Be A Good Tutor?

A good tutor is available on a regular basis least once a week for 20 (younger children) to 40 minutes per session. Remembering that each student has their particular situation and issues, a good tutor tries to tailor each session to the student's needs. Each student makes academic progress at their own pace and therefore a good tutor has a low expectation (and frustration) level. What can be hoped for is that, over time, there is progress with the student's attitude toward the subject matter, then academic performance, then self-esteem.

#### What Does It Take To Be A Good Student?

A good student is available on a regular basis least once a week for 20 (younger children) to 40 minutes per session. A good student works as hard as they can that day to try to catch-on to what the tutor is teaching. If they can help it, a good student tries not to get too frustrated or waste the tutor's time.

#### **How Does It Work?**

Potential tutors must fill out TWO online forms: a Tutor's Information Form and a Tutor's Permission Form. After a tutor's application is accepted, their nickname, credentials, the subjects and grade level they want to tutor, and their availability will be given to Students who have applied for tutoring in that subject matter and time slots.

A Student's parent or guardian must complete TWO online forms: a Student's Parent or Guardian



Information Form and a Student's Parent or Guardian Permission Form.

Note: Two forms are required because (i) only the Information Form will be exchanged between potential Tutors and Student's families and (ii) only the Information Form can be modified from time to time without re-submitting a copy of a driver's license or State ID since only the Permission Form deals with legal matters.

After a student's application form is accepted, a list of Tutors whose subjects, grade level and available time slots seem to match will be sent to the parent's or guardian's email. It will be the job of the Student's parent or guardian to contact one or more of the Tutors listed to (i) try to find a match and (ii) interview the Tutor further, if desired.

It will be the job of the Tutor to notify volunteertutor.org that they are no longer looking for a match.

## 2022 Friday Meetings Review

Responsibility for Friday meetings shifted to the 2nd Vice President in 2022. However, the success of the meetings is a collective effort. All the pieces of the puzzle must fit together for successful meetings to occur. I thank a few of the unsung men who contributed to the weekly effort: Frank Mei, Jim King, Jim Zyla and his team, Willy Williams, Lon Kolakowski, Robert Sparks, Gary Melikian and Bob Hayes.

Attendance at Friday meetings rose 8.9% in 2022 with an average of 135 per meeting. This is up from 124 last year. The average attendance since September has increased to 142 persons per meeting. Of those, only 24% are on Zoom in contrast to 42% during the first quarter of the year.

Satisfaction surveys conducted throughout the year

showed members enjoy the Friday meeting, with an average score of 8.3 out of 10 (10 being the highest). Three components of a meeting affect the level of satisfaction: the speakers; the meals; and the efficiency of the business portion of the meeting.

Speakers: Each speaker is evaluated on four variables with a possible composite score ranging from 1 (poor) to 5 (excellent). The median score for speakers this year was a 4.45/5 with over 75% rated good, very good, or excellent. Speakers addressed a diverse set of topics from the new Gordie Howe Bridge to the ghost army during World War Two.

Meals. On average, over 80 members join us for lunch each week with a high of 124 this fall. Vegetarian/vegan dishes and gluten-free items are now available. There are more frequent theme lunches. Matzah was made available during Passover..



Special items were included for Diwali and Chicken Francese was served the day of the Van Gogh exhibit's curator's talk.

It's critical those coming both for lunch or just the meeting pre-register. This assures adequate seating for all. Beginning January 3, those seeking lunch without pre-registering will be charged an extra \$5.

<u>Business Meeting:</u> Let's admit it. Some of our members like to talk. It is a continuing struggle to keep our meetings on time and reports within the time set by the Club Procedure Manual. Our business meetings will always be a work in progress.

2022 has been quite a year with interest rates rising, inflation of various forms and what almost seems like a daily 1-2% swing in the stock markets. We have been fortunate to have several speakers share their expertise with respect to stocks, bonds and other items that affect our financial lives. The plan is to continue providing timely financial industry expertise to the Investment Group in 2023.

We will take a shift with our next speaker from paper assets of our investment portfolio and learn about physical assets such as silver and gold. John Abbott of Abbott's Coin, Jewelry and Appraisals will share his industry leading knowledge with our group. John and his family started the business in 1956 as a coin dealer and have grown over the years helping people with their personal property needs. This present day Birmingham,

MI based business is internationally recognized corporation, and will share their expertise with the group.

Despite the recent down swings in the market, the Stock game which began on October 14th, is led by Jerry Peck who is up 54%, 2nd place is held by John Murray who is up 42%, and Randy Barnett is in 3rd place up 39%. The top three stocks are Moderna (MRNA) up 54%, ASML Holding (ASML) up 53% and Nividia Corp. (NVDA) up 51%. These percentages compare to the Dow Jones Industrial Average, which is up 11% and S&P 500, which is up 8% since 10/14/22. Proud to write that 44 of our 54 stock game entries are above the starting point of the original \$100,000 game investment starting point, and 22 are beating the S&P returns!


