IMPORTANT 2024 DUES ANNOUNCEMENT

The Senior Men's Club of Birmingham Board of Directors has approved an increase of \$20 in the amount of membership dues for 2024. The new dues amount for 2024 will therefore be \$90. The related fees (new member and late fee) will remain the same.

The last increase, also of \$20, was effective for 2022. At the time of that proposed increase, there was much discussion relative to raising the dues too much and therefore creating "sticker shock". While our expenses increased in 2022 due to the new meeting venues at the Iroquois Club and Baldwin Library, we were able to offset some of those increases by taking advantage of the reduced Friday meeting rental rate due to decreased weekly attendance caused by such factors as Omicron, weather and missing "snow birds".

The good news for 2023 has been that we have been averaging attendance of 109 in person for the Friday meetings. As a result, the bad news is we are not able to take advantage of reduced rentals. The charges to use the library for meetings have increased a bit due to more frequent meetings, but those costs are closely monitored. The current projection is that there will be budget shortfalls of over \$3,000 in 2023, and \$6,000 in 2024, with taking no action to increase dues.

Our balance sheet cash numbers are very robust, but in the event that we should face a catastrophic change in Friday meeting venues, that amount will quickly be depleted. The recent review of weekly charges by other venues to host a Friday meeting bears out this point.

As with 2023 dues, we are asking that you "round up" your payment to \$100 (or more) if you so choose to provide us with more revenue. Finance Committee representatives will be collecting dues paid by cash or check in person at Friday meetings starting September 8th. You may also mail your check to - **SMCB P.O. Box 1149 Birmingham, MI 48012**. For those looking for a credit card payment option, you may visit the SMCB website to remit your dues.

The Board of Directors hope you all feel that dues of \$90 per year are a true "bargain" and we continue to grow our membership by being able to offer you, our SMCB members, informative and quality speakers, fellowship and an enjoyable lunch at a cost that can't be beat!

Our committee is now soliciting candidates for the officer position of corresponding secretary for 2024. By tradition and our procedure manual, the top five elected officers (president, first vice-president, second vice-president, recording secretary, and corresponding secretary) progress through the ranks, moving up each year.


