Foundation Grant to Alzheimer's Association of Michigan




On June 12 the Senior Men's Club Foundation presents Alzheimer's Association Michigan Chapter with a \$10,000 donation for respite care scholarships.

The Senior Men's Club Foundation reflects the will of the Senior Men's Club of Birmingham. This outreach to our community is emblematic of the generosity and community spirit of the men of the club. Respite care provides care givers a temporary rest from care giving, while the person living with Alzheimer's continues to receive care in a safe environment. Respite care can be provided at home by a friend, family member, volunteer, or paid service or in a care setting, such as adult day care or long-term care community. This care opportunity is focused around the Birmingham area. For many who are care givers to a spouse or relative, it is a 24/7 responsibility. The opportunity for brief periods of relief is most helpful.

From 2000 to 2024, the incidence of death from Alzheimer's increased by 73%. Alzheimer's makes up 60-70% of dementia cases.

It is the practice of the SMC Foundation to give "targeted grants" to help and support senior men in need in the Birmingham area.



This month we will begin with John Meacham's recent discussion of Abraham Lincoln's life and legacy and then move to John Grisham's first and only work of non-fiction dealing with a successful effort to exonerate a former baseball player who was awaiting execution.

Both groups will continue to meet via Zoom. As always, all members and their guests are welcome.

Wednesday, July 10, 10:30 AM: And There was Light: Abraham Lincoln and the American Struggle by John Meacham.

This book tells the story of Lincoln from his birth on the Kentucky frontier in 1809 to his leadership during the Civil War to his tragic assassination in 1865: his rise, his self-education, his loves, his bouts of depression, his political failures, his deepening faith, and his persistent conviction that slavery must end. In a nation shaped by the courage of the enslaved of the era and by the brave witness of Black Americans, Lincoln's story illustrates the ways and means of politics in a democracy, the roots and durability of racism, and the capacity of conscience to shape events.

From Doris Kearns Goodwin: "Biography at its best, the great historian Barbara Tuchman wrote, paints an intimate portrait of an individual which simultaneously provides a sweeping view of history. With this deep, compelling work, Jon Meacham has achieved this gold standard. Written with wisdom and grace, his story of Lincoln's complex moral journey to Emancipation mirrors America's long quest to live up to its founding ideals."


Monday, July 22, 3 PM: The Innocent Man by John Grisham In the town of Ada, Oklahoma, Ron Williamson was going to be the next Mickey Mantle. But on his way to the Big Leagues, Ron stumbled, his dreams broken by drinking, drugs, and women. Then, on a winter night in 1982, not far from Ron's home, a young cocktail waitress named Debra Sue Carter was savagely murdered. The investigation led nowhere. Until, on the flimsiest evidence, it led to Ron Williamson. The washed-up small-town hero was charged, tried, and sentenced to death—in a trial littered with lying witnesses and tainted evidence that would shatter a man's already broken life, and let a true killer go free. One reviewer described it as "Impeccably researched, grippingly told, filled with eleventh-hour drama, The Innocent Man reads like a page-turning legal thriller. It is a book no American can afford to miss" George Stern will lead this discussion.

On Monday, July 8th at 1:00 PM, John Maten will present, via Zoom, the classic comedy/horror film "Young Frankenstein" (1974) (1 hour / 46 minutes).

Directed by Mel Brooks and adapted from the original novel by Mary Shelley (first published in 1818), the film is a parody of the classic 1931 film "Frankenstein" released by Universal Pictures and directed by James Whale.

The story opens as respected medical lecturer Dr Frederick Frankenstein (Gene Wilder) learns that he has inherited his infamous grandfather's estate in Transylvania. Arriving at the castle, Dr Frankenstein soon begins to recreate his grandfather's experiments with the help of servants Igor (Marty Feldman), Inga (Teri Garr), and Frau Blucher (Cloris Leachman). After he creates his own monster (Peter Boyle), new complications ensue with the arrival of the doctor's fiancée, Elizabeth (Madeline Kahn.)

The film was nominated for two Academy Awards: Best Adapted Screenplay and Best Sound. The movie was very well received by the critics and was a commercial success grossing about thirty times its cost. The film has a strong following to this day. It has a current Rotten Tomatoes Approval Rating of 94% and an IMdb Rating of 8.6/10. The consensus reads, "Made with obvious affection for the original, Young Frankenstein is a riotously spoof featuring a fantastic performance by Gene Wilder."
